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Movement: Looking to the Future

I. Movement

- a. One person can make a difference
- b. Two of the same mind are even better
- c. But there is no telling what can be done with thousands, or even millions who are committed to the same goal
- d. That is the marvel of movement
- e. As Geoff said yesterday, interesting history (not boring history) involves the stories and details of people, those same kind of elements that make our lives interesting
 - i. Discovering things about their dynamic and interaction with others
 - ii. The details of their context
 - iii. Their aspirations and dreams
 - iv. Their besiefs
- f. Movement requires these same elements, but activated in the present, and looking to the future
 - i. This is to say that movement does not happen in isolation or in stagnation
 - ii. Amovement needs to be dynamic interacting on all levels with both its:
 - 1. Past
 - 2. Present
 - 3. And engaging those in the future
 - iii. Amovement needs to speak to its context

- 1. Itneeds to answer questions that people are asking
- 2. It needs to cultivate awareness of the its surroundings
- 3. It needs to offer the invitation to be a part of something that makes a difference
- iv. That difference needs to be manifested in captivating aspirations and dreams in other words, a vision

II. Members of a Movement

- a. That said, we are members of a movement
- Б. Participants in an existing dynamic
 - i. Look around you right now this is movement
 - ii. This is a particular element to our dynamic
- c. But the question for us, as we come to the close of this weekend, and move back into our individual contexts, until we all meet again next year is: Shall we keep moving?
- d. Id like to suggest this morning that we can, and we must
- e. Now, Scannot give the magic formula or fairy dust, or the sophisticated fix-all answer, but Ido believe that, collectively, we need to take into consideration several things as we step forward and consideration them seriously

9. Movement Means Interaction:

- a. With those who came before us
 - i. We are not born into vacuums
 - ii. But we all have inherited a faith from those who came before us
 - 1. Whether we grew up in the church
 - 2. Or whether we were brought into the church through the influence of someone else
 - iii. But whatever the case, we cannot escape the influence of those who came before us
 - 1. Good

- 2. Bad
- iv. One of the issues that Geoff and Shoped to focus on this weekend was our identity, and our identity is closely tied to those from whom we have received our faith
- v. Yet to ignore their contributions and challenges is to, at least in part, take for granted what we have received
- vi. We say "history repeats itself", history is not cyclical, it is linear, just as time is linear
- vii. Nevertheless, it is in our best interests to
 - 1. Interact with them
 - 2. Learn from them
 - 3. Sensitively critique them
 - 4. And take the results of all that and carefully apply it to curselves
- viii. Additionally, Restoration is not simply going back to the beginning, to the NT-that is
 - 1. Restoration is not a-historical
 - 2. It is affected by the influence of our immediate and less-immediate past
- ix. Ever ask, "Why are we the way we are?"
 - 1. Part of the answer is to examine our immediate past
- x. So, as we move forward, we must have interaction with those who came before us
- b. With those whom we will leave behind
 - i. Whether you are 16 or 65, you exert an influence
 - ii. And the influence that we want to establish with those in our immediate context, and ultimately with those whom we will leave behind is a positive one
 - iii. That said, we need to pay careful attention to how we give that influence, and it needs to come in words and actions that are
 - 1. Given intentionally

- 2. Given in Jove
- iv. Again, "Why do we do what we do?"
- v. "Why do we say what we say?"
- vi. "Why do we believe what we believe?"
- vii. "What are the implications upon us to do, say, and believe these things?"
- viii. We cannot take these matters and questions lightly because there are always eyes upon us
 - 1. And Idon't say that so that we act out of fear or compulsion
 - 2. But rather, that people observe whether something is worthwhile to us by the attention that we give to it
- ix. So we ought to practice restoration with conviction, intentionally
- x. And express our convictions to those around us with love, intentionally

c. With those with whom we may differ

- i. Flargely say this to indicate our interactions with those within our own fellowship, but it also applies
 - 1. Those in other faith groups who may be asking the same questions
 - 2. To the larger lost of the world
- ii. Conflict and disagreement can sometimes be good
- iii. Interms of The Restoration Movement, these situations can help crystallize the concept that much more in our minds when we must answer questions and/or our opponents
- iv. But in communicating ourselves, the key thing to not forget here is:
 dialogue
 - 1. And as James says in 1:19, "Be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to become angry."
 - 2. We are sometimes quick or too apt to make judgment calls that are not ours to make when differences arise
 - 3. But when differences arise, it is our obligation to work hard, to work hard, hard at reconciliation, at finding agreement, and to be of one mind

- v. And so Isay, "Let us not be more eager to be right than to be reconciled"
 - a. Isay this as an attitude, and not to discredit our commitment to truth
 - b. And so, I say this realizing that we cannot always, nor should we always be reconciled with everyone on all points
 - c. But it is to say that we ought to be eager to seek the unity that Jesus prayed for in his high-priestly prayer in John 17 "that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and Jam in you."
- vi. Let's talk it out

d. With ourselves

- i. What Imean is that we need to have dialogue with ourselves
- ii. We need to ask ourselves difficult questions and be honest with ourselves
 - 1. Which is exactly what our forebears did themselves
 - 2. They were not satisfied with the status que, and we can't be either
 - 3. Whether that means we arrive at the same conclusions or not is one thing
- iii. But we need to continue to examine ourselves
- iv. And it essentially means that, in a sense, we are continually seeking to be closer to God and his will

e. With God

- i. Ive saved this interaction for last because Ido believe it is the most important, and gives us the greatest potential to keep moving
- ii. We must have interaction with God
 - 1. Through his word
 - 2. In prayer
- iii. As we have expressed over the last few lessons, God has revealed his will for us in his Word
- iv. And it is a double-edged sword, living and active, penetrating to divide soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart Heb. 4:12

- v. Hwe are serious students of God's word, it will cut us, and it will cause us to do something about it it causes us to move!
 - 1. They were cut to the heart
 - 2. And they asked, "Brothers, what shall we do?"
- vi. Additionally, at around 2:00 last night, Paul, Sean, myself and Geoff were discussing the "power of prayer" as expressed in Jesus' teaching about moving mountains and having faith
- vii. Our dependence upon God in prayer will keep us asking for
 - 1. God's wisdom
 - 2. God's strength
 - 3. God's vision
 - 4. God's forgiveness
 - 5. What we are asking for is God's movement within us!
- viii. A Restorationist recognizes from searching the Scriptures that restoration means communication with God
 - 1. In Word
 - 2. In Prayer

II. Two Conditions

- a. Continually
 - i. If we desire that we should have movement in Restoration, it must begin with ourselves
 - 1. We cannot depend upon the movement of the past
 - 2. And we cannot wait for those ahead of us to move
 - 3. We must move ourselves, and continually seek restoration ourselves
 - ii. As Geoff mentioned last night, Restoration is unfinished until Christ returns
 - We must remember that nothing will be perfect, no achievements will last forever

2. Until Thrist returns

b. In Christ

- i. The danger is that we limit our focus
 - 1. Are we looking for our movement
 - 2. No, we are looking to advance into God's plan
- ii. We must maintain the focus on Christ
- iii. We have mentioned identity
 - 1. Let us never, ever, ever forget that our identity is ultimately found in Thrist
