PERIODICAL REFERENCES TO ST. CATHARINES IN THE 19TH CENTURY

Researched by Geoffrey Ellis

CB [The Christian Banner], IX, 8, Aug. 1855, 241 – Excerpts from the report of Alexander Campbell's visit to Canada: "The beloved Campbell and lady and youngest daughter arrived in St Catharines among the first days of August, or rather the last days of July. Being enfeebled by various labors previously, and needing repose, brother Campbell did not immediately commence his labors in our country, but for some days tried the virtues of the St. Catharines Springs. Having been invigorated either by the mineral waters or other agencies, he addressed the brethren and friends in the village of Jordan, Saturday evening, August 4th. On Lord's day 5th brother Campbell delivered an address at St. Catharines, the Baptist chapel having been granted for the occasion. Monday evening he arrived in the township of Eramosa..."

CB, X, 4, April 1856, 131, – NEWS OF ACCESSIONS, "From brother Palmer of St. Catharines, we learn that two have lately been immersed at Jordan.

BF [Banner of Faith], XIV, 5, July 1861, 170 – DO reports visiting St. Catharines and being courteously received by the Baptist elders there, but regretted that the chapel there was not available. "... we found true disciples of Jesus known by the name Baptist."

MGW [Message of Good-Will to Men], XVIII, 7 & 8, July/Aug. 1864, 123 – J. William Kemp writes DO from St. Catharines, 10th June, 1864, speaks positively about Oliphant's reply re the cooperation question.

BI [Bible Index], I, 2, Feb. 1877, 58-59 – Letter from Mrs. Alexander Campbell, Bethany, West Virginia, Jan. 12, 1877, to Brother McDiarmid (upon receiving an issue of the *Bible Index*) "...It is pleasing to me to see two of Bethany College students' names affixed to it, yours and brother Sheppard's...It was always a matter of pleasure that dear Mr. C., recurred to his visit among the brotherhood in Canada West. A committee of some eight or ten visited St. Catharines, Bro. Ash, Bro. Lister, Bro. Farewell with others...Bro. John Scott with a son of Bro. Joseph Ash, were good reputable students of Bethany some time ago, all of which is revised in my memory. Brother D. Oliphant was for some time an inmate in our family, and also a student of Bethany College. His unwearied labours in the gospel speak well for him..."

CW [Christian Worker], III, 5, March 1884, 2 – FIELD NOTES. (HBS) (St. Catharines) "On Friday we came on to St. Catharines and domiciled at Bro. Sol. Wardell's, whom we found very anxious to see the cause established in that city. We looked over the city and viewed the available places for holding meetings, and decided that they were very good, and that the right kind of an effort would succeed. After calling on bro. Campbell and his invalid wife, and meeting a few others of the scattered disciples we left for Welland..."

GM [Gospel Messenger], II, 4, Apr. 30, 1895, 8 – OBITUARY. Sister Matilda Walker, wife of Bro. W. A. J. Walker, died at her home, St. Catharines, Apr. 17, 1895, at the age of 41 years. Funeral at Beamsville Apr. 19, burial at Mt. Osborne cemetery. H. F. Stevens

GM, II, 8, Aug. 30, 1895, 8 – OBITUARY. Eva Grace, daughter of W. A. J. Walker of St. Catharines died July 31, at the residence of Robt. L. Walker, Beamsville, aged 5 months and 10 days. H. F. Stevens

CW, III, 10, Aug. 1884, 2 – FIELD NOTES (HBS) Bro. Lister has been working in St. Catharines.

CM [Christian Messenger], IV, 1, Jan. 1, 1900, 2 – ST. CATHARINES. W. D. Cunningham, provincial evangelist, reports: This church is about two years old, about 30 members, "but does not co-operate with other churches in Mission work. Trustees are Chas. Clause, Geo. Culp and ___ Laws; treasurer, Wm. Walker. They have no elders and no deacons. They have no Sunday school,

no prayer meetings, no Christian endeavor. The members meet in the morning and J. H. Sterling of Toronto preaches at night. The deed for their property forever prohibits the use of an organ. S. Jones of Nashville, Tenn., began a series of meetings November 2. One has been added up to Nov. 23rd, when the writer attended the meeting. Two copies of THE MESSENGER were taken. Most of their literature is published in Tennessee. They do nothing for Home or Foreign missions.

Obituary: Geo. Lama - Chas. W. Petch

Bro. Geo. Lama, a motorman on the local line of N. St. C. & T. R. between St. Catharines and Thorold, was fatally injured in a collision near Merriton, and died a few hours after at the hospital here, on Feb. 17th. He leaves no near relatives, his wife having died about two weeks before. Bro. Lama died at the age of 34, and was never known to have one bad habit. His character, as a moral man, was almost blameless. His position on the railway, and his wife's long sickness and blindness, kept him from regularly meeting with the church; but he seemed to be glad when he did get to meeting. His funeral was largely attended, as he was well spoken of by all who knew him. Our meeting-house did not accommodate all who came. I improved the opportunity to present the gospel of Christ, and the preparation that is necessary for the judgment after death and the resurrection. "In the midst of life we are in death." Dear reader, are you prepared for the summons, which may come "as a thief in the night?"

Another June meeting is recorded among the events of time, and the brethren have returned to their respective homes and posts of duty, stimulated for another year's work in the master's cause, by the many good things which they heard from the word of truth, and by the hallowed associations of their beloved brethren, during the three days of the meeting.

While with deep regret we announced the unavoidable absence of Bro. E. A. Elam, because of sickness in his family, yet we were cheered up by the presence and powerful preaching of Bro. S. M. Jones, who returned from the south just in time to fill Bro. Elam's place at the meeting. As I heard his strong voice echoing through that spacious building and beheld the deep interest manifested on the face of his auditors, while he fearlessly proclaimed the truth, I asked myself, "How much better could Bro. Elam do?" With the exception of Bro. J. A. Harding, no man has influenced my life like Bro. Jones. We were indeed glad to have him here, and we feel sure that if any present were in any way prejudiced against Bro. Jones yet they could not "withstand the wisdom and spirit by which he spake."

The meeting opened on Saturday June 9th at 3 p.m., with a rather small attendance. Short, edifying speeches were made by a number of brethren, and a welcome extended to all. A much larger crowed assembled at night and heard a much needed and profitable discourse from Bro. S. Whitfield on, "What must I do to be saved?" Bro. W., emphasized the observance of "all things whatsoever I have commanded you" as being applicable to the Christian and necessary to salvation.

On Lord's day morning Bro. W. F. Neal of Meaford delivered a strong and convincing discourse on "God's thoughts and ways are not man's thoughts and ways." Bro. Neal has been laboring in Canada for more then five years, and has shown himself to be not afraid "to declare the whole counsel of God." His presence and preaching was quite a help to the meeting.

The meeting would hardly be a success without the presence of that venerable veteran of the cross Bro. Forrester of Toronto, who presided at the Lord's table, and kept up well under the infirmity of age. To see such aged veterans as he, Bro. Duncan Stirling, Bro. Riley and others, still "contending earnestly for the faith" is a source of great encouragement to us young brethren. If they have "fought the good fight, finished the course, kept the faith and are now ready to be offered," yea! waiting and yearning for the departure to be with Christ, why cannot we be as faithful as they have been. May He who has cheered and comforted them in their long warfare, strengthen us to brave the battle fearlessly.

On Lord's day afternoon Bro. Jones preached to about five hundred people on the great theme "God." He called attention to several characteristics and attributes of God which are seldom or never spoken of by modern preachers. He emphasized the point that false ideas of God will surely lead to an evil life and produce a false religion. At night Bro. Jones again preached to a good audience on the subject of "Death and Life" from the text. Rom. 6:23.

On Monday afternoon the writer preached to an assembly in the church house on the subject of "Loss and Gain" from Phil. 3:7, 8. Perhaps the best meeting of all was held on Monday afternoon, when short talks were made by several brethren on the question How may we most advance the cause of Christ in Canada at this present time? It was an inspiration to hear and see the zeal for mission work and church edification expressed by numerous speakers. The necessity of getting the scriptures into the minds and hearts of all people seemed to be the main thought. This is to be accomplished best by more individual effort everywhere by everyone, by evangelistic work in the weaker churches and in destitute fields, by more interest being taken in the Beamsville Bible School where young men and women may be more quickly and thoroughly fitted for the great mission of life, which is expressed in the above question. St. Catharines June Meeting

The leaders of the church at St. Catharines sent invitations to brethren both grouped and isolated, to meet them on June 11th, 12th and 13th, for mutual edification and to worship God.

Saturday at 3.30 p.m., with Bro. H. Stevens leading, short talks were given from Bathurst, Fern Avenue, and East Toronto, Smithville, Jordan, Beamsville, Owen Sound, Cape Rich, Fenwick, and Pine Orchard.

At 8 p.m. Bro. M. Watterworth delivered a splendid address, 'As unto a light that shineth in a dark place."

On Lord's day morning, at 10 o'clock, we met in the Opera House (our meeting house would have been too small), where we listened to nine brethren make short speeches on the grand theme, "Brotherly Love." At 11 o'clock Bro. Jackson, of Toronto, addressed the congregation, now 700 strong, on "The Efficient Church, its Task and Program." Bro. Jackson spoke with power.

Bro. James Stewart, one of the oldest brethren present, presided at the Lord's Table, using the words, "Whatsover He saith unto you, do it." The fellowship was over \$225.00.

After the communion we adjourned to the Park, where baskets were opened and the physical "inner man" refreshed.

Bro. W. D. Campbell spoke to us at 3.30 p.m., "A more excellent way" being his subject, and again at 8 o'clock on "Conversion to God." Bro. Campbell's simple, plain, logical, forceful but loving presentation of the truth makes him a prime favorite among us all.

After the evening meeting there was a discussion regarding a more consistent living up to our plea of Christian unity, and progress made, we believe, in pointing the way to a scriptural unity of brethren.

On Monday morning Bro. Helleyer, who was chosen by some of the churches to have the keeping of the funds they had contributed for evangelistic work in weak places, read his report to the assembled brethren, (he will also send the report to each church directly), and arrangements were made for a larger work. In order to avoid the danger of building up an organization which would usurp authority which belongs only to the church, it was suggested that the churches in the Niagara Peninsula should administer their own funds, and likewise Meaford and vicinity would arrange for a helper in the work in that neighborhood, while Toronto and its surroundings will work together for the advancement of the Master's cause, both at home and abroad.

Bro. Gibson, of Toronto, made a strong appeal for more pronounced effort in support of the Gospel in foreign fields, and we hope to see the churches doing more in the future.

At 8 o'clock at night Bro. C.W. Petch made one of the best efforts of his life, "The Everlasting Brotherhood."

Bro. Russell, of Stouffville, announced that it was the intention of the church there to invite the brethren to meet with them next year, some time in June.

Brethren visited from most of the Ontario churches, many isolated brethren, and from several States in the Union, and we could most heartily sing, "Blest be the tie that binds our hearts in Christian Love."

Report of the Secretary

As Secretary and joint custodian of the fund along with Bro. Alex Stewart, who shares with me the responsibility of a strict account of all moneys contributed, I would report as follows:

CO-OPERATION.

"Come, let us reason together."

We know that throughout our fair Ontario there are many little groups of Brothers and Sisters striving, as best they can, to uphold the Banner of the Cross, but believing comes through hearing, and we are not all teachers. It was to give these weaker ones encouragement and assistance that the movement was started, all contributing to a common fund for the support of an Evangelist to labor with those most in need of assistance, and report progress to all concerned, thus drawing us closer together in Christian love and fellowship. I regret to state that, from a financial point of view, all the churches have not yet shown their sympathy with the movement but we feel that all are interested in the Cause generally. We especially regret the support rendered by the churches in Toronto, together with Pine Orchard and Stouffville, all being wholeheartedly in the work and, should the district plan be decided upon, we may look for a good account of their stewardship.

EVANGELIZATION

Bro. McPhee, a young and enthusiastic servant of our Master, labored in the interest of the Cause for some six months until he took up the work at Meaford. During this time our Bro. Schell was acting as Secty.-Treas. Any further information desired up to Dec. 31, 1920 will be cheerfully given by him.

Acting under instruction, our Bro. Watterworth was induced to come and assist us at the beginning of April. During that month he labored faithfully with the churches of Meaford section and even the April showers failed to dampen his enthusiasm. Wet weather prevailed but four responded to the Gospel invitation at Cape Rich and were baptized.

He arrived at Wychwood full of ambition and during the month of May covered the district well by visitation and held meetings every night for at least one week. Here another was won for our Master. Our Brethren at Wychwood are loud in their praise of the encouragement and assistance rendered by our Bro. Watterworth.

St. Catharines section was hardly ready for him at the beginning of June, so Bathurst St. seized the opportunity of securing his services up to the present time, at their own expense. At the close of this meeting, I believe, he goes to Woodgreen, near London, where he will establish a Cause that will be a shining light in years to come.

Bro. Watterworth is a Canadian boy, residing at present at Harper, Kan., a condition that Ontario should not allow to exist any longer than necessary. We need such men to help make our Plea better known in this Province.

DISTRICT PLAN.

Ontario seems rather large for one Evangelist to cover and it is suggested for the consideration of this meeting, that we continue to work together in Missionary and Evangelistic work, but for greater efficiency that we form into districts and, in order to keep in close touch, consult each other in our problems and successes and meet at least once a year, possibly in a June meeting.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

"Go ye into all the World."

Many churches in Ontario are contributing separately to Foreign Missions and it may be well to consider combining forces for a definite work. In this connection our Bro. Gibson of Fern Ave. has some interesting information to submit.

FINANCES

On Feb. 3, 1921, we held our last combined meeting, when I was instructed to secure the services of an Evangelist for the months of April, May and June, if possible, our Bros. Claus of Valdosta, Georgia, allotting for that purpose \$500 and expenses, each of the three proposed districts to have his assistance for one month. Securing Bro. Maitland Watterworth.

Believing it to be an unfair and dangerous misrepresentation of facts we refer to it in the hope that the speaker in question will not again use it to the (unintentional, it may be) misleading of his hearers.

The statement was "We are divided on matters of opinion and not over matters of faith."

Brethren present took strong exception to the expression. And it neither represents the facts nor shows respect to the judgment of the brotherhood in general. We are of the belief that numbers of God's people have had to separate themselves from others on matters of Faith and Christian Principle, while they are just as eager for Unity as the brother who made the above statement. Moreover, we know, and we think the speaker knows some who have suffered much by preferring division to dishonesty. It was a pity such an unwarrantable affirmation was allowed a place in an otherwise profitable discourse.

The Evangelistic Efforts

made by the two churches in St. Catharines after the Meeting have been productive of much good. Bro. Petch worked up to his reputation as a forceful and energetic Proclaimer of the Gospel. A report from him tells of one man being baptized and the two congregations brought into harmonious co-operation in the Lord's work.

So another of these mountain-top experiences takes its place in memories of the past, there to inspire fresh courage and deepen our love for those of like faith and hope.

OBITUARY

Brother Alonzo Wallace, was born July 31st, 1861, at Mill Village, Nova Scotia; died at St. Catharines, Ontario, Oct. 24th, 1932. He was in his 72nd year, and had been active until about a year ago, when he entered the Sanitorium, where he continued to improve for some time. As Autumn approached, and the leaves fell and Nature changed her glorious robe of summer into her drab and dreary robe for winter, his strength failed, and quietly at the approach of day he slipped out of his mortal dwelling place to the land where changes never come.

While a young man Bro. Wallace was baptized, and for many years he was a member of the Church at Mill Village. After moving to Ontario, he took an active part in the church work, and at the time of his departure he was a member of the church at Niagara and Manning Sts. When this congregation was started he gave unsparingly of his time and money. For almost a year he worked unceasingly, without remuneration, upon our present House of Worship, and it is doubtful if the church would enjoy the use of this neat and comfortable house, for which he worked and prayed; and into which his mortal remains were carried, when his loved ones, friends and associates met to look for the last time upon his features on earth. The writer was assisted by Bro. Petch and Bro. Keffer in the services. His body was then conveyed to his old home in Nova Scotia, where another service was conducted by Fred L. Wallace, after which his earthly remains were interred beside his loved ones.

In less than a year before his death, his aged mother and only living sister passed to the great beyond. How glorious the home coming and sweet the reunion.

The work at Niagara and Manning Streets continues to go forward. We have now reached the greatest Bible School attendance in the history of the church. The church in this part of the city continues to make its influence felt, and we trust that before long a large congregation will be built up here.

June 1936, 5th issue, p.21 - Under title "Our Indian Road" W. Eatough. "Gratefully Acknowledging . . . St. Catharines \$20.00 . . . "

p.23 - Reports – Alex Stewart of Toronto (not dated) . . . "I was with the church at Beamsville, Ont. Service morning and evening, two meetings. The June meeting for Churches in Ontario will be held there on June 7th. In the afternoon we attended a meeting at St. Catharines, Bro. W. F. Cox was the speaker. There was a good attendance, and interest was fine."

Sept. 36, p.17 – Dear Brethren in Christ:

Please read carefully Bro. W. F. Cox's letter concerning the 'Radio Ministry'.

For nearly sixteen months, as you will see, Bro. Cox has been delivering evangelistic addresses, every Monday evening over the air, station C.K.T.B. St. Catharines, Ont. During this time he has given services without charge.

Brethren, it requires time to prepare suitable material to speak over the air, to be considered Scriptural for a critical public, and to crowd into fifteen minutes so much truth. His sermons have been instructive, profitable, and educational. In addition to this he drives around twenty-six miles to deliver these discourses necessitating considerable expense for gasoline, oil and upkeep of car.

We were fortunate in having the privilege of broadcasting fifteen minutes for the small sum of \$4.00 per night. Other stations charge much more.

Our financial standing at present is very low, and should any of the brethren desire to help in this good work, please remit your donation to the above address or to the secretary, Mr. M. G. Miller, 61 George St., St. Catharines, Ont.

May 1937, p.15 – Cecil Bailey reported that E. Burdett of St. Catharines was one of several speakers at the closing session of the Bible School at Selkirk.

October, 1937, p.14 – Announcement that Roy Cogdill was scheduled for nine weeks of meetings, Jordan (2), Niagara St. (2), Beamsville (3), Raymond & Beecher (2). W. F. Cox.

February, 1938, p.14 – Each Lord's Day afternoon at 2 P.M. brother Roy Akers and brother C. G. McPhee speak over the air alternately. Then each Monday evening brother W. F. Cox of Beamsville broadcasts at 8:45. "To the brethren of the Church of Christ may I say that these brethren would appreciate your prayers and support" Stanley McInery, Selkirk.

March, 1938, p.16 – ". . . preached yesterday, Feb. 6th, at Peken, N. Y. and visited the brethren at St. Catharines in the evening." Stanley McInery, Selkirk

April, 1938, p.14 – letter dated March 6, by M. G. Miller.

"The work here is going on as usual. Our Monday night class of Young People seems to be gaining in interest with an attendance of about 20 through the efforts of W. F. Cox"

St. Catharines was again represented at the closing session of the Selkirk Bible School.

p.16 – Both St. Catharines congregations began to be included in the directory of churches. Roy K. Akers is the minister at Niagara Street.

May, 1938, p.15 – the Young People are again mentioned as doing well "through the continued efforts of W. F. Cox.

June, 1938, p.8 – D. A. Sinclair, on a tour in Ontario speaking "in the interest of the Saskatchewan work" spoke at both congregations in May.

July, 1938, p.16 – St. Catharines sent \$20.00 toward the support of brother Trindle according to a listing of support for the work among the Indians under the title OUR INDIAN ROAD. It appears that this was done regularly every six months or year.

September, 1938, p.6 – Excerpt from OUR CANADIAN PREACHERS, Charles G. McPhee.

"In 1931 he started work with St. Catharines and Jordan and brought about the restoration of fellowship between the St. Catharines churches. He remained there between five and six years."

February, 1939, p.16 – OUR INDIAN ROAD, acknowledgement that for the year 1938 St. Catharines gave \$20.00. The directory for Niagara Street shows Allen Killom, evangelist in place of R. K. Akers, minister.

April, 1939, p.15 – Edna Jolliffe expresses her appreciation of the GOSPEL HERALD as a paper she could "certainly give to any one without having to tar any pages out."

July/August, 1939, p.11 – "Also, Bro. Cox speaks over the radio on Monday and is working with Beecher and Raymond St. Catharines church and other points." Carrie Ellis.

October, 1939, p.10 – "We had Bro. O. H. Tallman here (Tintern) in the month of July, he was at Meaford, Woodgreen, Selkirk, both congregations at St. Catharines and Beamsville one Lord's day, having three meetings at most, if not all of the places." Ernest Perry

April 1941, p.14 – March 19, 1941. – "The work is showing real signs of progress here. Once a month we send out letters to our friends and neighbors inviting them to a special gospel service held the first Lord's day evening in each month. The results are very gratifying. Each month we print a tract for distribution among our Bible school children and friends, which has been instrumental in making new contacts.

Right now we are making a drive to cut down the mortgage on the church building. God granting, the fall meeting of the churches of Christ will be held here in the Y. M. C. A., Oct.12, with Brother D. D. Woody of the St. Elms church of Christ, Chattanooga, Tennessee, as the main speaker. Brethren, keep this date open and plan now to be with us. After this meeting Brother Woody will hold a two or three weeks' evangelistic meeting with us.

The brethren of the Niagara St. church of Christ really are workers as the attendance, interest and contributions indicate.

I am also preaching for the good congregation at Niagara Falls, N. Y., where interest is high. – Allen Killom."

July 1941, p.14 – July 3, 1941 – "The work of the Lord is showing activity here at the Niagara St. church. The congregation has recently paid off over half of its indebtedness on the church building. We hope to burn the mortgage next year, God granting.

Brother O. H. Tallman of Cambridge, Mass., has recently closed a good meeting at the Raymond St. church with three baptisms. Bro. Tallman did some very good preaching and efficient work while he was with this church.

I shall be in the States in evangelistic meetings from the middle of this month till the middle of next month. – Allen Killom."

August 1941, p.6 – Allen Killom of the Niagara St. church replaces Lillian Torkelson as editor of the Young People's page in the Gospel Herald.

October 1941, p.10 – "We were also made to rejoice when we heard of the recent baptism in St. Catharines. The soul had come through to enter the kingdom of God.

December 1941, p.8 – Allen Killom will no longer edit the Young People's page as he begins work with the church of Christ at Frankfurt, Kentucky on the first of January.

p.14, 15, Nov.8, 1941. – "The fall meeting of the churches of Christ through out this district, held at the Y. M. C. A. building here Oct. 12, was well attended. Bro. D. D. Woody, evangelist of the St. Elmo Church of Christ, Chatanooga, Tenn., spoke three times to appreciative, attentive audiences. After this great meeting Brother Woody continued in a service of evangelistic services at the Niagara St. meeting house. The meeting closed on Oct.28, with an overflowing crowd attending. Interest and attendance grew continually throughout the meeting. Brother woody is a fine preacher because of his kind, interesting presentation of the gospel. The brethren thought so highly of his work among us that they asked him back for another meeting in 1942.

God granting, I expect to leave here on January 1 to take up work with the church at Frankfurt, Kentucky. The brethren have been good to me and my family and it will be hard to leave. The co-operation and assistance have been wonderful ever since we came here in Sept. 1938. We shall long remember the kindness of this church. – A. Killom"

April 1942, p.14 – I also spent one night with the church in St. Catharines (Raymond and Beecher) having the privilege of meeting with their new preacher, Brother Flannery. Also revived acquaintance with several brethren (received a number of renewals and subscriptions).

May 1942, p.15 – April 24, 1942 – We just finished our two weeks meeting, a fine meeting, lots of good preaching and instruction though no additions, but we have high hopes for the future D.V. Brother Flannery did the preaching. E. Burdett.

June 1942, p.11 – Brother E. Burdett of 103 Chaplin Ave., St. Catharines has made arrangements to bring these (tracts – More Than Live, Unsaved Christians & Church Music) into the country. You may order direct from him. . . . If you cannot pay, order anyway, the tracts will be shipped.

October 1942, p.14 - . . . a few of the activities of some preaching brethren . . . Brother D. W. D. Sinclair has taken up work with the church at Niagara and Manning in St. Catharines. The church there will be in a protracted meeting with his assistance when this is in print. We are glad to see Brother Sinclair back in full time work again. . . .

December 1942, p.3 – Mortgage Burned

On August 31, 1942, the mortgage on the Niagara Street church building St. Catharines, Ontario was burned. My family and I were happy to be present for the occasion. Seventeen of the twenty seven charter members were there. This congregation began meeting in this building in the spring of 1930. It has had quite a growth since that time. O. E. Tallman, Alex Stewart, C. G. McPhee, R. K. Akers and Allen Killom have labored with this church. In September of this year D. W. Dryden Sinclair of Saskatchewan began work there. It is reported that the church is progressing nicely. There is a fine group of brethren in this congregation. – Allen Killom, Frankfort, Ky.

p.14 – St. Catharines, Ont. Raymond and Beecher Streets, November 23, 1942 – On November 11 we closed a ten day meeting with brother E. J. Craddock of Nashville, Tenn., as the speaker. Interest and attendance were good throughout. The last week we used a public address system to carry the sermons to a large Bible School room we were compelled to use to accommodate the crowds. Brother Craddock's sermons were inspiring and instructive. Many visitors heard the gospel in its purity for the first time in their lives. One young man came out of the errors taught by the group known as the "Church of God" and another made confession of having erred. The Lord's Day following the meeting the mother of three young ladies, who were already Christians, was baptized. We are planning to have another meeting in the spring. We cannot share the view of those who postpone meetings because a war is in progress. We know the devil is not postponing his work of destroying men's souls. – Emerson L Flannery.

January 1943, p.14 – D. W. Dryden Sinclair Reports – January 5, 1943

I came to this city about three months ago to work with the Church of Christ at Niagara and Manning streets. Since that time I have preached fifty-four sermons and have made more than

one hundred visits for the church. I have had one wedding and was in charge of one funeral since I came here.

Soon after arriving I held a two week for the church. This was attended only fairly well. A few visitors attended and many of the members attended only occasionally. There was nothing accomplished by the meeting as far as could be seen.

Morning services here are attended quite well but the other meetings are attended rather poorly. There are, as is often the case, the faithful few who are always present regardless.

The Sunday school is well attended. Usually there are seventy-five or eighty present.

For the past six weeks I have been going to a colored people's Baptist church to speak for them after the evening service. They have been without a minister for fie years. They are very appreciative and so far appear to enjoy plain Bible teaching. How much good will be accomplished remains to be seen. It was an opportunity and it seemed advisable to take advantage of it.

February 1943, p.12 – Since the last report went into the Gospel Herald there have been two additions to the church here. One from the Christian church and the other by baptism.

I am happy to report that our services last Lord's Day as well as a week ago were well attended. We are hopeful that much good will be accomplished. D. W. Dryden Sinclair.

April 1943, p.13 – Brother McPhee is in a meeting with the Strathmore congregation in Toronto. Brother Box starts at Raymond and Beecher in St. Catharines. D. W. D. Sinclair goes to Maplewood Ave. in Toronto for a meeting the middle of April. . . . I shall go to St. Catharines later. This is an exchange meeting. Brother Sinclair will be coming here later for a meeting.

Brother Sinclair reports one more baptism from Niagara St. in St. Catharines.

Mar. 21 – This has been a busy day with me. I preached here twice, at Port Colborne, and for the colored people here in the city. One made the confession here this evening. We look forward to a meeting with Bro. J. C. Bailey, our editor, this spring.

D. W. Sinclair, Niagara St. St. Catharines.

p.14 – This may be a little late for an annual report but here it is:

In 1942 the church here employed me to give full time to the work of the church. During the year the church had two protracted meetings, both lasting for two weeks. Through the year there have been over 125 sermons preached here; about 140 Bible classes; and many personal talks with interested parties. Besides the preaching her I have spoken a few times at the neighboring churches of Christ, including Tintern, Beamsville, Jordan, Port Colborne, Hamilton (West Dale). Niagara and Manning Street, (St. Catharines), Niagara Falls, N. Y., Omagh and at the Bathhurst Young People's Meeting.

During the year there has been a gain of seven members, some of whom moved to the city for work. Two were baptized, and one young man came out of the errors of the so called Church of God. This young man speaks German and plans to prepare to work among the German speaking people in mid-west Canada. He is now in Brother Orr's Bible School at Radville, Sask., to further prepare himself.

The contributions were up 38% over 1941. At present they are up 69% over 1941, and 22% over 1942. The ladies have set aside one night a week to sew for the needy. This practical Christian work has been neglected here for many years. Several large boxes of goods have been sent out to the needy.

We have improved the premises some by new lighting fixtures, new sign in front of the building (with glass enclosed bulletin board), new song books, painted the floors of the classroom and vestibule, and a few other odds and ends.

The church seems anxious to forget the things that are behind and press on. Plans are being made to do more work in the Lord's vineyard this year than before. Beginning on April 4, and lasting to April 16, Brother Box of Toronto will conduct our spring meeting. We look forward to a great year's work with the church here.

May, 1943, p.14 -

April 21, 1943

Robert E. Box of Toronto recently closed a two weeks meeting with the church here. Several visitors came to the services who had never been to our meeting house before. Brother Box gave us sound gospel sermons that were good for the church as well as being edifying to the sinner. A young married couple, parents of two children, were baptized the last night of the meeting. Three nights of the meeting two young Mormon "elders" (?) were present. They were in a mood to argue after the services, but when the discussion got too lively they never came back again.

THE EDITOR REPORTS – As we go to press I am in a meeting at Niagara and Manning in St. Catharines. Two very good meetings on Sunday. Following the evening meeting Bro. Swan took me to the meeting of some colored people, where I had the privilege of preaching for them. Bro, Sinclair has been preaching there for some months. I was impressed with their sincerity and they listened attentively.

June 1943, p.13 – D. W. DRYDEN SINCLAIR REPORTS

St. Catharines, Ont., May 12, 1943

We have just closed a two week meeting here. In spite of gas rationing and tire conditions, we were well pleased with attendance. Bro. J. C. Bailey of Meaford was the speaker, and one of the brethren said, "He really made a name for himself down here." Bro. Bailey surely did a splendid job of his part of the meeting. I am sure that I can speak for the entire congregation of the church when I say we will be happy to have Bro. Bailey back any time he can come. A fine number of outsiders heard him and his messages were such that would be helpful to the church, so all of us benefited by his efforts,

July 1943, p.14 – BRO. E. L. FLANNERY REPORTS

June 15, 1943

On Sunday evening, June 13, we had the pleasure of hearing the good confession made by three young ladies, and baptizing them at the close of the service. Two were the daughters of our Secy.-Treas., M. G. Miller. We are happy to know that Ina and Myrna are now Christians. The other was Joyce Beck, daughter of Brother George Beck, who is a leader in the nearby church in Port Colborne. These three are going to the Omagh Summer Bible School, which will be of benefit to them as young Christians.

We lost one of our church leaders in the passing of Brother James H. Johnston last Thursday, June 8. Brother Johnston moved to this city with his family in 1922. He has been a good worker in the congregation since coming here. He and Sister Johnston were married for over 44 years. He was a Christian for over 50 years. Brother Cox of Beamsville conducted the funeral services.

Brother H. C. Bynum (colored) of Detroit is conducting a meeting among the colored people of this city in an effort to start a church. His messages are clear and inspiring and he is not shunning to declare the whole counsel of God. The meeting is under the supervision of the Niagara and Manning Sts. Church. St. Catharines, June 30, 1943

Bro. D. J. Bynum, colored evangelist from Detroit, Mich., closed a ten day meeting with the colored people in this city last week. Those who heard him enjoyed his splendid sermons. He was very disappointed in the lack of support from the two churches in this city. It should be mentioned, however, that a few members did attend very regularly. The meetings were held in a building that belong to the Baptist Church. There are a number there who definitely are interested in the church of the New Testament. One of them, a man who has been the leader of the group for years, never missed a meeting in

spite of the fact that he had to come directly to meeting from work without his supper. Then after the meeting he had to hurry with his supper and work for a few hours as caretaker in some offices. In all kindness please let me say we need men like him in the church; we suffer from the lack of

them. It is my personal desire to have Bro. Bynum back in St. Catharines Again soon. We enjoyed every minute of his stay in our home.

p.15 – Obituary of JAMES HAMILTON JOHNSTON (excerpts)

James Hamilton Johnston passed away on Tuesday, June 8, 1943. He leaves his wife, Mary A. Johnston; three daughters, Florence, Mrs. John E. In 1921` he moved his family to St. Catharines. p.14 – BRO. E. L. FLANNERY REPORTS

August 113, 1943

The St. Catharines church seems to be growing steadily in various ways. Our attendance has improved this summer over the last. We have had more visitors to the services, which indicates that they are being invited by some of the members. The mid-week classes are about three times as large as they were this time last year. Several young people are attending. The contributions so far this year have increased 31.41% over 1942 and increased 78.8% over 1941. The increase occurred despite the fact that some of our liberal givers have moved away. The leaders here are using this liberality to500 copies of an evangelistic magazine are being distributed here each month, aside from othr tracts and bulletins.

The Port Colborne church has asked me to work with them for a time and I am doing that.

The other church in St. Catharines are happy over the four new members they have. Four out of five girls that went to the Omagh Bible School obeyed the gospel. The leaders at Niagara and Manning streets are to be congratulated for their good Sunday school work, and the efforts they put forth to save the souls of the youth in their community.

October 15, 1943, p.4 – Delayed Report – D. W. DRYDEN SINCAIR REPORTS

Sept. 18, 1943

Glad to report another meeting with Bro. Bynum from Detroit is to begin September 19 with the colored people of this city. In order to make ready for this meeting and to do all possible to insure its success, I induced my father, Bro. D. A. Sinclair to come from Winnipeg to visit among the colored people here. He has been enjoying many fine visits. We look forward to having Bro. Morris Bailey and Sister Bailey with the Niagara and Manning congregation here for a week or two. There was one baptism here a few weeks ago.

p.14 - D. W. DRYDEN SINCLAIR REPORTS

October 8, 1943

On October 3, 1943, our second protracted meeting of the year with the colored folks of this city ended. In this second meeting we were pleased to hear Brother A. C. Holt of Nashville, Tennessee, Bro. D. A. Sinclair from Carman, Manitoba and Brother Bynum from the Cameron Avenue Church of Christ. Detroit. Although much better than our first protracted meeting, the attendance was only fair. We appreciated having visitors from neighboring towns as well as from the city. During the effort, four colored people were added to the body of Christ. My own daughter, Helen Marie, made the confession and was baptized. For the present meetings will be conducted in my home for the colored people until a building can be arranged for. The plans now are to secure a lot and build a small meeting house or to buy a building that can be converted into a meeting house. The start has been made, but much work is still ahead. Pray for us that we might succeed.

December 1943, p.11 – BRO. E. L. FLANNERY REPORTS

Nov. 22, 1943

From October 24 to November 5, Brother Jack McElroy of Nashville, Tenn., conducted a meeting here. His preaching was plain and forceful, and much good should come of it. Good attendance was manifested though none obeyed the gospel. We need to have several such efforts every year to get the best results.

Brother J. C. Bailey, Meaford, was here for two weeks, and preached for several nearby congregations. He visited several homes and did much personal work while here. While he was here I was in Heathcote, Ont., in a meeting which was in exchange with Bro. Bailey.

There was a young lady, Margery Curtis, baptized here last Sunday night. She will be remembered by the ones who attended Omagh Bible School last year. This made the seventh to be baptized here within the last year.

February 1, 1944, p.14 – CRADDOCK AT ST. CATHARINES

We have just learned from Brother Gay that Brother Craddock of Nashville, Tennessee, is with the Niagara and Manning St. congregation for a period of four weeks. This ministry began on Jan. 16 and would continue for four Lord's days.

Brother Craddock has held several meetings in Ontario so is not a stranger to many of the brethren.

February 15, 1944, p.14 – BRO. E. L. FLANNERY REPORTS - January 9, 1944

1943 was a very good year for the Raymond Street Church in a number of ways. Attendance has increased. Several new visitors attended our services. The church conducted two protracted meetings during 1943. Brother Box as the speaker for the April meeting while Brother McElroy was with us in October. During the year around 240 teaching and worship services were conducted in our building. We have distributed over 3000 religious tracts, over 2500 religious magazines, over 3500 pieces of advertising, 2000 church bulletins, as well as advertising in our local paper each week. I preached 186 sermons; taught 170 Bible classes.

Contribution averaged \$49.73 per week, a 77% increase over 1941 and 28% above 1942. Considering the fact that only twenty-three or twenty-four of our members are wage earners, we believe this to be a liberal church, and think it will compare favourably with other Canadian churches.

During the year we witnessed six persons baptize into Christ. One soul is worth more than the world. But from a purely money basis, the church only spent \$431.12 per person baptized

during 1943, not considering that we had fellowship in the Omagh school work having furnished one of its teachers, in which 21 were baptized.

Plans have been discussed for a similar plan of work in 1944. And as soon as the war is over we have a vision for widening our contacts to other communities where there is no church.

March 1944, p.14 – NOTICE

After two years and three months with the Raymond St. Church, St. Catharines, I am leaving to begin a "mission" work in North Carolina. My work here has been enjoyed and I believe some progress has been made.

April 15, 1944, p.15 – Bro. E. L. FLANNERY REPORTS

April 4, 1944

Our work with the church at Raymond and Beecher streets, St. Catharines, was terminated on the last Lord's Day of March. For the past two years and three months we have worked with this fine congregation and it was difficult to leave our many friends in Canada.

The church at Raymond street has been looking forward for years to the time that elders could be appointed, thus coming to God's pan in church government. After much teaching on this subject the congregation chose Brother Frank Conn and Brother Murray Miller as elders. They were appointed at a special meeting of the church called for that purpose on March 15, 1944. These men are fine Christians. Both having been Christians for years – forty years and seventeen years respectively. All the children of both of these men are Christians. The church should make progress under the oversight of these men. The church should rejoice in knowing they have grown to a fully organized New Testament church.

Brother C. R. Elerick of Columbus, Ohio, spoke to the church Sunday, March 26. His sermons were very good. The church asked Brother Elerick to accept the evangelistic work at Raymond street, and he did. He will begin his work here in June. Brother Elerick has preached the gospel for years, and we are glad he agreed to come here to work.

At this writing Brother Lemons is conducting our spring meeting. Brother Lemons labours with the Strathmore congregation of Toronto.

November 1944, p.15 - BRO. CHARLES ELERICK REPORTS - Sept. 11th. 1944

They told me when I arrived in June to take up the work with Raymond and Beecher congregation that you had left an invitation for me to write now and then for the Gospel Herald. I had every intention of doing so –and still hope to – but I have gotten into such a round of activities I haven't been able to settle down and write very much.

With the co-operation of other congregations in the peninsula, we have begun Christian workers' training classes on Thursdays. At the initial session last week we had about 60 in attendance. The classes include vocal music, to be taught by Bro. J. Curtis Manor of Niagara and Manning streets, this city (I am subbing for him while he is away in September); personal work and teacher training, taught by Bro. C. G. McPhee; my class in public speaking, and a series of discussions in charge of Bro. O. H. Tallman of Niagara Falls, N. Y. Allowing time out for protracted meetings, the ten sessions will come to a close December 7.

On September 1st I closed a one week meeting at Port Colborne, Ont., where services are held in the Odd Fellows' hall. Attendance grew until there was a well-filled house at the final service. One young woman obeyed the gospel and was buried with her Lord in baptism in the waters of Lake Erie.

The church at Raymond and Beecher is planning its fall series of meetings to start October 1st and continue over the 15th, with your humble servant doing the preaching. Current attendance and contribution reflect an increasing interest in the work here, and on Wednesday evenings, following our mid-week Bible study, we are engaging in a complete review of the hymns we expect to use during the meeting.

February 1945, p.14 – BROTHER MCPHEE REPORTS

Beamsville, Ont.

.....We are still preaching over the radio. Brother Tallman is speaking for the church at Niagara Falls. Brother Cox is on the air too. Brother Killom will return to Niagara and Manning.

April 1945, p.13 – A picture of Allen Killom with the announcement of his return to the Niagara and Manning church.

November 1945, p.14 – BRO. KILLOM REPORTS

Since my return to St. Catharines I have been very busy. Let me say, too, that we are happy to be back in Ontario. The work of the Lord is very encouraging at Niagara St. Five have been baptized, including a young lady baptized at Omagh this summer who became a member here. I taught two weeks at the Omagh Bible School and enjoyed the time spent there along with the students and other teachers. In August I concluded a meeting at Mitchellville, Tenn.. I have just returned from one in Pontiac, Mich., with the church where I preached my first sermon fifteen years ago. The church here is having a meeting from Nov. 4 to 16 with O. H. Tallman, of Niagara Falls, N. Y., as the speaker. We print a little paper, the SENTINEL, each week at Niagara St.

January 1946, p.14 – NEWS FLASHES FROM THE NIAGARA DISTRICT

There seems to be plenty of enthusiasm among us here. We are in great need of some good sound preachers in these parts.

Jack McElroy, of Nashville, Tenn., held a helpful meeting at the Raymond St. church St. Catharines, back in October, with two baptisms.

Right after this O. H. Tallman of Niagara Falls New York, was with the Niagara St. church of this city in a good meeting. Bro. Tallman gave some excellent lessons to the church.

February 1946, p.9 – Fall Meeting at St. Catharines

The Fall Meeting of the Churches of Christ in Ontario was held at the "Y' in St. Catharines on November 11th with around 350 people in attendance. O. H. Tallman of Niagara Falls, N. Y., spoke in the morning on "The City of God" and in the vening on "Love for All."

The afternoon session did not follow the ordinary course, having one or two speakers, but rather it was a discussion forum on "Successful Evangelism" with several speakers making five minute talks on the subject. It was really interesting and instructive, There should be more like discussions.

You may glean a few thoughts from the condensed remarks which follow:

Ernest Burdett, Raymond St., St. Catharines: "... to successfully evangelisze is to convert the alien sinner.... The sin of the local church is self-satisfaction. True Christianity reaches out to others to the extent that people feel and know your interest in their souls. If we are filled with the Spirit of Christ we shall have successful evangelism."

W. F. Ellis, Smithville: "We are in partnership with Christ . . . In United States there are 15,000 preachers of the Church but we have about a dozen. We need schools to train our young men . . . Character and good deeds are not rationed."

p.14 – NEWS FOM ST, CATHARINES ONT.

There is considerable activity here. Bro. E. L. Flannery, N. N. held a good meeting at Raymond St. church in April. One was added.

A co-operative meeting in which both the churches are taking part is to be held in the Niagara St. meetinghouse from Sept. 15 to Oct. 6 with Cecil E. Hill of Longview, Texas preaching. We plan to do extensive advertising so the meeting will come before the public.

Recently a young married woman made the good confession at Jordan and was baptized at Niagara St.

Both of the churches are now printing weekly bulletins –The Sentinel and The Raymond St. Review.

Bro. Whitfield and I are enjoying the work we are doing together. He is a very congenial co-worker.

One young lady was baptized at Niagara St. recently and a woman confessed sins at Jordan.

The two churches in St. Catharines are in the midst of a series of special classes on personal work with an average attendance of 35 to 40. The interest in these classes has been good from the first session. Several members at Tintern and Jordan have attended. The teachers are Bro. Killom and Bro. Whitfield.

June 1947, p.15 – REPORT FROM ST. CATHARINES

From April 13th to 17th Homer A. Daniel, of Paducah, Ky., was in a joint meeting of the two churches here. All of the meetings were held at the Raymond Street church building. The crowds were good throughout the series of services. Bro. Daniel's sermons were packed with Bible truths and sincerely delivered. Art Walker, of Hamilton, lead the singing the first week and Ernest Burdett and Loney Wallace the second week. One was restored.

For nearly two years, Bro. John Whitfield has been the faithful minister of Raymond Street. I have enjoyed working with him in this city.

For about a year this congregation has been sending a bus each Sunday a distance of five miles to Port Weller to bring children to and from Bible School. This effort has been very successful, not only in increasing the enrolment in our Bible Classes, but also, through the necessity of canvassing the Port Weller district, it has developed personal workers within the congregation.

Probably most people nearby know that my family and I love Niagara Street. It was our concern for this place that brought us from Louisiana back to St. Catharines.

November 1947, p.6 – HISTORY OF RAYMOND STREET CHURCH OF CHRIST (picture of building included)

The Raymond and Beecher Street church had its first meeting on August first 1897. in the Banner Hall on St. Paul Street, when a small group of consecrated Christians were gathered together under the leadership of Brother J. Madison Wright. The services were held in this hall for six months, after which the present building and lot were purchased and paid for, the deed being secured before any services were held at the new location.

In their new quarters a very substantial growth was realized and in a few months thereafter with the assistance of Brother Samuel Keffer in a protracted effort, a number of souls were won for Christ, thus lending strength and encouragement to those who had borne the burden of getting the work started. Following the effort of Brother Keffer, Brother S. M. Jones of Nashville, Tennessee, was secured to conduct services indefinitely and his labours resulted in many more being added to the congregation.

For the next few years of endeavour, Howard Sterling, W. D. Campbell, C. H. Petch, Harry Jackson, G. E. Claus, L. J. Keffer and O. E. Tallman assisted in building up the congregation. It was during Brother Tallman's services that this congregation swarmed and a group of members that constituted the original congregation formed the nucleus for a new congregation at Niagara and Manning Streets. These two congregations are enjoying fellowship and co-operation together and recently joined their efforts in two protracted meetings that strengthened the tie between them.

Among the prominent preachers of days gone by, the following have held meetings for this congregation: T. B. Larimer, W. F. Neal, H. M. Evans and Daniel sommer. Some of the more recent ones were Roy E. Cogdill, E. J. Craddock, Jack McElroy, C. Lemons and Homer Daniel. Those who have done located work with this congregation in recent years are C. Elerick, E. L.

Flannery and W. F. Cox. Brother Cox started a radio program in this city in 1935. Since the beginning of 1946 Brother John S. Whitfield has been located with this congregation.

Our preachers and leaders who did much to build up the work in this place could be mentioned to whom much credit is due for the increase and strength of this congregation. Nearly all the charter members who bore the responsibility and burden of the pioneer work have died. The mantle has fallen on other shoulders and under the efficient eldership of Brother M. G. Miller and Brother Frank Conn this congregation numbering between sixty-five and seventy members is reaching out to do greater things for the Lord. They are lending encouragement to the few faithful brethren at Port Colborne by sending their preacher to them for one service on Sunday as well as frequent mid-week Bible studies. They also have taken a leading part in lending encouragement and support to the new congregation at Ivon Avenue in Hamilton. With the co-operation of other congregations they have also assumed the responsibility of seeing that Brother Cox is supported in that good work.

While our Sunday Bible school is not large, it is well supervised with a fine staff of teachers and under the able leadership of Brother Ermest Burdett, is making favourable and noticeable progress.

The immediate prospect of the congregation is to send Brother Whitfield to Collingwood for the opening of their new building with a protracted effort to follow, while Brothere William D. Medearis of Royal Oak, Michigan conducts our annual Fall meeting here. May our eyes be opened to every opportunity for advancing the Master's cause both at home and abroad is our constant prayer. Mrs. Frank Conn and John S. Whitfield.

p.8 – NIAGARA STREET ST. CATHARINES

As one of the charter members of the congregation of the church of Christ meeting at Niagara and Manning Streets, in St. Catharines, I have been asked to write a history of that congregation.

In the year 1928 the brethren started meeting in private homes. The first meetings that I recall were held in the home of Brother and Sister Fries on Wellington St.: assembling on Lord's Day morning for Breaking of Bread and Bible school, and during the week for a prayer meeting. We were fortunate at that time in having the late O. E. Tallman preaching for us. The membership then number thirty-four. The next spring the congregation began meeting in the Oddfellows' Hall, and continued there until the fall of 1929.

Shortly after moving to the Hall the brethren decided that a meeting-house should be build. A lot was purchased at the corner of Niagara and Manning Streets (the present location) and enough money was raised among the members to pay for the lot and to purchase an old Presbyterian church house at the top of the Beamsville mountain. This building was torn down by the members and, by the generosity of an interest contractor in St. Catharines, was trucked to the lot. There our building was erected by the brethren under the direction of Brother A. Wallace, the writer's father, who also did a great deal of the work, devoting to it one whole year of his time.

I might state here that, in connection with the tearing down and erecting of the building, every piece of material with the exception of the flooring and joists was marked when taken down, and it was put together the same way, even to the siding on the outside and plastered inside and newly floored.

Bro. Tallman continued to labour with us. He was indeed a great man of God, a pillar in the church. Loved by all. However, Bro. Tallman was soon to be taken from us for in the fall of 2930 he went to his reward.

The late Bro. Alex Stewart then laboured with us for some six months, speaking Lord's Day evenings only. The local brethren had charge of the morning service. Prominent among these Bro. A. Wallace, who was always ready to fill in on a few minutes notice.

Preachers following Bro. Stewart were Bro. C. G. McPhee, Bro. R. K. Akers, Bro. A. Killom (who became our first full time preacher, the others having shared their time with the Jordan congregation), D.W.D. Sinclair, C. Manor, and now Bro. Killom is back with us again, having been here this time since April, 1945.

Our membership at present is about sixty-five. The growth has been slow but a good work, I believe, has been accomplished. Many families have, during the last several years, moved away from our city and are meeting with other congregations. This, I suppose is the natural course

of events. A bright spot in the last few years has been our Bible school, through which we have reached several homes as well as boys and girls themselves.

This spring we canvassed a district about five miles from the church house known as Jones' Beach, and also the highways leading to it. The response was encouraging. As a result a bus has been hired to bring the boys and girls to Bible School. The number coming by bus, I believe, would average twenty-five per Lord's Day. The average attendance now is about 90. We are hoping through the boys and girls to reach the parents of that district. A canvas to that end is planned for the end of this month.

The annual June meeting of the churches of Christ in Ontario held this year at Beamsville and sponsored by the Raymond and Beecher Street congregation in St. Catharines is now history. If it was not the best, it was as good as the best ever held in the province. The attendance was possibly the largest ever, approximately seven hundred and twenty five persons being in attendance.

The general theme for the whole day was "Evangelism." The meeting start off in a fine way with a large attendance even at the early morning meeting. Brother Johnson of the Beamsville congregation presided over the meeting and Brother H. A. Rogers, who is well known for his past evangelistic efforts in Western Canada led in the prayer. The following five young preachers; Herman Johnson, Ralph Perry, Charles Draper, Sam Blackwell and Bethel Bailey spoke five minutes each on the following subjects; "Training for Evangelism," "Evangelism Through Christian Living," "Evangelism Through The Sunday School" and "Starting The Work in New Places." Then Brother O'Neal, another of our young Evangelists, led in the dismissal prayer. The addresses of these young men were all outstanding and spoke well for their keen desire to see the work of spreading the gospel go forward. May their zeal never lag nor the churches fail to lend them every possible encouragement, is our constant hope and prayer.

Brother W. F. Cox of the Ivan Avenue congregation in Hamilton presided over the eleven o'clock hour of worship and Brother McPhee very ably took charge of the Lord's table. Brother J. Since 1928 there have been two congregations of the church of Christ, worshipping and working in the city of St. Catharines. The Niagara Street congregation has done effective work in the past. Several preachers have served the church throughout the years. Among those who served were Charles G. McPhee, Roy Akers, Allen Killom, Walter Dale and Ralph Wharton. Several others have assisted at various times. A splendid Sunday School was conducted and many young people received teaching and training which helped them greatly since removing to other congregations.

The older congregation at Raymond Street dates back to March 23rd, 1898. Under the leadership of Madison Wright, a church building was purchased from the Anglican church for the sun of \$750.66. This building has served the congregation for over sixty years, but has been greatly improved and enlarged. The Bible School facilities were increased by the construction of a basement, however they are becoming inadequate for effective work with an increased enrolment. The main auditorium will handle about 200 people.

On December 4th, 1960 the congregation at Niagara Street moved in a body to Raymond Street and united their forces with a determination to push forward the work of the Lord. We now have a congregation of about 150 members, and a good working force, which should mean progress for the future.

The congregation at Raymond St. has been helping churches and preachers for years, such as Port Colborne, Fredericton, N.B. and Japan. Also Owen Sound and Hamilton received support in the past. Last summer, when Bro. Ralph Perry decided to move to London, the Church assumed responsibility for the London work to the extent of \$50.00 a week, for one year. Now with an increased membership and larger contributions, we hope to do more and better work. However, our home responsibility has greatly increased, as we have to assume the mortgage on the Niagara Street property as well as seeking a new location and providing a larger building for future growth. The spirit of co-operation and brotherly love will mean greater things for the Lord's work in St. Catharines. We look forward to the day when the influence of this church through the power of the gospel will be felt in the growing city and in the regions far beyond.

For many years the churches in this part of Ontario have conducted a Radio Program over C.K.T.B. It is now being carried by the Raymond Street Church and can be heard all over the Niagara District, Hamilton, Buffalo, Toronto and as far North as the Manitoulin Island.

On Jan. 16th a Lectureship will start at the church building in St. Catharines and continue through the 20th. The general theme discussed will be the church. The following speakers and their special subjects are listed below.

ST. CATHARINES BEGINS LARGE BUILDING

The church of Christ was established here in the city of St. Catharines, before the turn of the century. Bro. Madison Wright and other members became interested in obtaining a house in which to worship. One was purchased from the church of England. This was remodelled about ten years ago.

In 1928 Niagara Street started and continued to work and worship in the building erected at the corner of Niagara and Manning. For many years it did an excellent job among the young people of the community.

On December 4, 1960 this group moved to Raymond Street and the two congregations became one. This taxed our capacity to the limits. More seats had to be provided and Sunday School rooms altered. During the past year the church has planned and looked forward to a new building.

After much discussion and dickering with the authorities, two acres of land were purchased on Ontario Street, North of the Queen Elizabeth Way. On October 12th the basement was started and on the 17th, footings were poured. Then on the 20th forms for the basement walls were erected, and it is hoped to have the building well under way before the cold weather hinders operations.

The building is of semi-modern design, with an auditorium that will seat between three and four hundred, full sized basement and ample parking space.

Brothers Gordon Stewart and Loney Wallace are contractors and Brother Jim Allcock spends much time supervising the plans. Many of the brethren have responded to the appeal for help. We look forward to the day when the building will be opened and the church can expand and serve the Lord and the people in a way it has never been able to do in the past.

In 1963 the congregation will entertain the brethren at the June Meeting, and we hope to have our meetinghouse ready for the following meeting.

Our lot and building will cost over \$90,000, and we trust by selling notes, together with donations and the sale of our present property to take care of the finances, without borrowing from a Mortgage company.--Charles G. McPhee

On August 1, 1897 the church of Christ held its first meeting in St. Catharines in the Banner Hall on St. Paul Street. Shortly after that a lot was purchased at the corner of Raymond and Beecher Streets which site was used until May 29, 1963.

Open house was held on Sunday afternoon, June 23 in the new building pictured on this page. It is on Ontario Street north of Linhaven Home for the Aged.

Ontario June Meeting

It was with the pleasure of the church in St. Catharines, to provide the oversight of the June Meeting, held this year in the Beamsville High School Auditorium, on June second. This was one of the greatest meetings of its kind ever held in Ontario. It was a full day of delightful fellowship, inspiration and gospel preaching. The three services were well attended, with over 1000 people at the morning service. The afternoon and evening services were only little short of that number. Every available space was occupied.

The preaching of the day was of the highest order. Bro. R. C. Oliver of Clawson, Michigan, delivered two masterful addresses at the morning and evening services. In the afternoon, Bro. Wesley Jones of Barrie, gave a scholarly message from the Word of God. At the morning service Bro. Bruce Merritt, was in charge of the Lord's Supper, which was handled wonderfully well for such a large audience. This is the first time in the history of such meetings that individual Communion cups were used. The three leaders of the day did a splendid job. Bros. Fred Smart, Harold Tabor and Gordon James, led the singing during the three meetings. In the afternoon a song service was conducted under the direction of Bro. Loney Wallace, with other singers taking part.

On Monday evening Bro. Oliver began a five day meeting in our new meetinghouse in St. Catharines. This was a very happy time for the brethren here. The meeting was well attended and outsiders were attracted, some of whom we hope to reach in the future.

Our new building is of semi-modern design, with a very attractive auditorium. It will seat 350. Located on a two acre lot, there is ample room for expansion. It has a full basement, providing space for the Bible School and was built at a cost of \$90,000.

With the facilities provided and the growing city of St. Catharines before us, it creates an opportunity and a responsibility for the church to press on in the great task of converting sinners and edifying saints. When in St. Catharines, you will find a welcome at the church of Christ, meeting at 439 Ontario Street, just North of the Queen Elizabeth Highway.—Charles G. McPhee

St. Catharines Church of Christ – Charles G. McPhee

The first meeting of the church of Christ in St. Catharines took place in the Banner Hall, on St. Paul Street, August 1st, 1897. The preacher at that time was Madison Wright. Through his guidance and co-operation with some brethren, a building and lot were purchased at the corner of Raymond and Beecher Streets. While this building was adequate for preaching services, it lacked space for the Bible School. About fifteen years ago it was given a major overhaul. It was moved, raised and placed on a new foundation. A new entrance was constructed and Sunday School rooms provided.

In 1928 some brethren from Raymond and Beecher started a new congregation and erected a meetinghouse at the corner of Niagara and Manning Streets. A good work was done here among the children of the community. This building was sold about two years ago; the brethren having united their forces with the old congregation, and having the understanding that we would look for a new location and a more adequate building. On May 29, 1963 the last prayer meeting was held at Raymond and Beecher, and now it has passed into other hands. Many memories remain with the few faithful souls that have worshipped and worked to extend the Kingdom of God, when the labourers were few and preachers were sometimes hard to obtain.

While we do not have a correct record of the men who served the church; we can recall that Bro. Charles Claus and Bro. Henry Stevens were elders and did much teaching and preaching for years. About twenty-five years ago, Bro. Frank Conn and Bro. Murray Miller were appointed elders and have served the congregation up to the present time.

While we cannot name all the preachers that have served faithfully in years past, we know that many contributed their time and efforts for the conversion of sinners and edification of Saints. Here are the names of a few men that preached for the church. Madison Wright, Charles W. Petch, Harry Jackson, O. E. Tallman, Lemuel Keffer, W. F. Cox, Emerson Flannery and John Whitfield. The present preacher, Charles G. McPhee has been with the congregation since the fall of 1952. The audience on Sunday morning then was about 70. The average for the first ten weeks of 1964 is 160, and the average contribution two hundred and ninety-five dollars. Many changes have taken place by reason of baptisms and death, with some falling by the way. We believe that great things will take place in the future.

This church has always taken an interest in other places. While it cannot answer every call, it has helped to support preachers in Hamilton, Port Colborne, Japan, Nova Scotia and recently donated \$6,500.00 to the church in London.

In 1962 a large lot was purchased on Ontario Street, north of the Queen Elizabeth Way. Work was started on a new building in the fall and on June 3, 1963, the first sermon was preached in our new building dedicated to the work of the Lord. This building is very attractive and serviceable, with a seating capacity of 350, together with a full basement and rooms for classes. While it cost about \$100,000.00, it is valued much higher, because of the donated labour, which made it possible to complete such a structure.

The church here is anxious to serve the Lord and the community. We trust and pray that the seed sown in the past will produce a rich harvest in the future. Many listen to the broadcast every Sunday morning over CKTB, which has been carried on the air since 1937.

(2) Will I be able to choose my place of employment. (3) Will it provide contacts for Christians. (4) Will I have good wholesome associations. (5) Will it provide adequate financial remuneration for family and church.

We have found that young people receive more benefit from discussion type meetings than simply being told.

BIBLE CALL IN THE NIAGARA PENINSULA by Don Whitfield, St. Catharines, Ontario

The church of Christ in St. Catharines (Ontario Street) has installed four automatic play-back telephone machines in their building and are co-ordinating the Bible Call program with other churches of Christ in the area. Niagara Falls, Tintern, Fenwick, Jordan, Smithville, and Beamsville congregations are all within the local phone-call range and all residents in these areas are able to make use of the Bible Call Service.

How does the program work? Basically, it consists of having up to 300 cassettes on different Bible subjects and answering different questions with Bible teaching available to be played to persons who call in with a request. Brochures listing the subjects have been widely distributed in the area.

The program is semi-automatic; that is, the machines do the work, but people are required to work the machines! Thus a lot of people are involved. Someone must maintain the playback machines at all times. It takes a lot of work and a lot of time. But it is already proving as successful in the Niagara Peninsula area as it has proved in many other places. Many contacts are being made for Christ, and many questioners are being given Bible answers to their problems.

Bible School, has been laboring successfully in Canada since January last and has just closed a fine meeting at Beamsville which resulted in twenty-eight being added to the one body. A full report is expected shortly. From Beamsville he went to Smithville where he is now engaged in a good meeting. When he is through there, his next meeting will be held in the city of St. Catharines, where Brother Madison Wright has been carrying on a good work during the past year.

Gospel Advocate, August 15, 1901, p. 527 Christian Standard, July 13, 1901 June Meeting, Tintern, Ont.

According to arrangement, the Churches of Christ in Ontario, which are well satisfied that Jesus, nineteen centuries ago, gave to the church "all things that pertain unto life and godliness," decided two years since to revive the "June Meetings," which the brotherhood of Ontario conducted during the long period when the Churches of Christ met together to encourage and strengthen each other, and spend the time of the meetings in spiritual upbuilding and preaching the gospel, instead of legislating for the church and planning worldly schemes and organizations not authorized by the author of the New Testament.

In 1899 the "June Meeting" was held at Beamsville, last year it was held at Smithville, and this year at Tintern, all in the Niagara District. The meeting held early in June last, was in many respects the best of all. The attendance was large, disciples being present from many points far and near. Among the churches well represented we can name Tintern, Beamsville, Smithville, Jordan, Selkirk, Attercliffe, Wainfleet, Fenwick, St. Catharines, Hamilton, Acton, Sherwood, Meaford, Pickering, Pekin, (N.Y.), Toronto (Brunswick Avenue), Toronto (Elm Street), East Toronto and others.
